To the Reader or Leader

These Bible commentaries explain the truth about God's Word in a way that is easy to read and understand. They are also easy to translate. You can use these books to study the Bible on your own or with others in a group. Each person should have his or her own book and a Bible if possible.



Now read this: Where you see this sign, it means you or your group leader should always read the Bible passage first before reading the words in this book.



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Think about this: Where you see this sign, the question requires more time and personal meditation.



Ruled teaching boxes: Where you see this sign, the information inside provides extra information at the time the Bible was written and for today's believers.

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The Jews who did not follow Jesus persecuted them. Other Christians who were not Jews sometimes judged them. Some believers were tempted to give up their faith (3:12; 10:26). Many had not grown strong in their faith (5:12-14). Others had become lazy or weary (6:12; 12:3). Some believers had stopped meeting together (10:25).

The writer has a clear understanding of Old and New Testament teaching. He uses them to encourage his readers to grow strong in faith and to live holy lives. His readers are also encouraged to help others in their faith. They are also encouraged to obey and to support their church leaders.

We are warned not to look back to our old life of sin. We are warned to throw off old habits and religious traditions. We are encouraged to build our new faith in Jesus Christ. He enables us to go forward into a deeper faith with Almighty God. Through the sacrifice of Jesus, we are encouraged to look forward to a future life with Father God and His Son for eternity. Therefore, we must be holy and witness to others how Jesus is at work in our lives.

A chief desire of the writer of Hebrews is that we should become great men and women of faith. He encourages his readers to share their faith and love with other believers. In this way Christians grow in faith, love and unity whatever their background.

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- Pray for those in distress and with personal needs.
- Pray for those who are persecuted for their faith.

Pray to the Father in the name of Jesus and in the power of the Holy Spirit (Jude 20). A life of prayer requires discipline but results in personal holiness.

FINAL WORDS OF ENCOURAGEMENT

Finally, the writer reminds us, 'Our Lord Jesus is the Great Shepherd of the sheep' (Hebrews 13:20; John 10:11). His Father God brought Him back from death. He did it through the blood of the everlasting New Covenant (Hebrews 13:20).

The writer then prays for his readers. 'May God supply you with everything good. Then you can do what He wants. May He do in us [all] what is pleasing to Him. We can do it only with the help of Jesus. Give Him glory forever and ever. Amen' (13:21).

The writer makes one final request. 'I beg you to accept my word. It tells you to be faithful' (13:22). This is His chief desire.

The writer then ends with good news about Timothy. He also sends good wishes from the believers in Italy (13:23-24). He adds his own wish for the grace of God to be with all his readers (13:25).

6. What sacrifices should we offer under the New Covenant (13:15-17)?
7. Are you seeking God to do more and more good things that are pleasing to Him (13:21; 2 Corinthians 9:8)?



Think about this: Are you willing to live a holy life (13:1-6)? Are you willing to suffer to help others to live holy lives (13:12-13)? Are you willing to sacrifice your life in serving and witnessing to others (13:15-16)? Are you willing to support your church leaders (13:17)?

CONCLUSIONS

The book of Hebrews was written mainly to Jewish followers of Jesus. They needed much encouragement. They were tempted to go back to their religious traditions. Sometimes they let traditions rule over the Word of God in the Old Testament, which is the foundation of our faith and strength.

INTRODUCTION

The book of Hebrews was written in the early days of the Christian church. It is a useful guide for all believers today. We do not know who wrote it.

The first readers were mainly Jewish believers in Jesus who were often called Hebrews. Some wanted to bring old religious traditions into their new faith in Jesus. Therefore, this book was a warning for them. It is now a warning for all Christians today. It warns us to leave behind any man-made traditions that stop the work of the Holy Spirit. It warns us to trust in the Lord Jesus Christ alone for our salvation and growth in the Christian faith.

The book of Hebrews explains that Jesus fulfilled everything that the Jewish high priests did with their sacrifices of animal blood. His death was the final blood sacrifice for forgiveness of sins. Jesus is the Son of God and is without sin. Therefore, the blood of Jesus was the perfect sacrifice for the sins of others. Jesus is the eternal salvation plan of God for Jews and for non-Jews. He is our Great High Priest for ever.

This book warns us to fully understand these things. The writer repeats the truths from God again and again. He knew how believers can become weak in their faith. He warns his readers to continue to follow Jesus. He did not want them to go back to their old ways. He wants their faith to be strong.



Now read this: Hebrews Chapter 1

OLD AND NEW TESTAMENT BELIEFS ABOUT JESUS

In the very first words of Hebrews, the writer points us to the Lord God Almighty of Jews and Christians who is Father of our Lord and Saviour Jesus the Christ. In the past, God used His Old Testament prophets to bring His message of salvation to people and nations (1:1). 'But in these last days, God has spoken to us through His Son' (1:2).

The writer of Hebrews shares with us many things about Jesus that Christians believe today (1:2-4):

- Jesus was with God His Father before the world began. The Lord God Almighty created everything through Him (1:2).
- Jesus is exactly like God. He shares the wonderful bright light of the glory of His Father. He has the power to control the Universe (1:3).
- Jesus came down to Earth in the way God planned, to save us from sin. He now sits at the right hand of His Father (1:3).

- Jesus is greater than the angels of God (1:4).

The writer of Hebrews quotes many times from the book of Psalms. The Psalms were written many hundreds of years before Jesus was born on Earth as a baby boy. They prophesied about Jesus. What they said many years ago came true:

- Jesus is the Messiah and Saviour. He was promised by God through the Old Testament writers (Hebrews 1:5; Psalm 2:7).
- Jesus is the first and only Son of God. Jesus is over all things. The angels worship and serve Him (Hebrews 1:6-7; Psalm 104:4).
- God Himself says that Jesus is God. The throne of Jesus will last for ever and ever. His kingdom will be ruled by what is right. He loves what is right and hates evil (Hebrews 1:8-9; Psalm 45:6-7).
- Jesus created the Universe, through His Father God and the Holy Spirit. 'The heavens are the work of Your hands.' They will change and pass away. 'But You remain the same. Your years will never end' (Hebrews 1:10-12; Psalm 102:25-27).
- Jesus sits at the right hand side of His Father. God will put the enemies of Jesus under the control of Jesus (Heb. 1:13; Psalm 110:1).

THE PURPOSE AND PLAN OF GOD IN JESUS

Jesus Himself said, 'Everyone who believes in Him can live with God forever. God loved the world [in this way] that He gave His one and only Son. Anyone who believes in Him will not die but will have eternal life' (John 3:15-16).

From the beginning of time, all things have been prepared for Jesus to come into the world. Each plan of God for sacrifice led to His final plan of salvation through Jesus alone (Romans 5:6-8). He sent His Son to take the punishment for the sins of the world. The blood of Jesus was offered as a sacrifice to save us from the power of sin, death and Satan (1 John 4:9-10).

People were able to see and touch the Son of God (1 John 1:1). He was the Lamb of God that was sacrificed (John 1:29). Now, Jesus is the Way, the Truth and the Life (John 14:6). No-one comes to the Lord God Almighty, except through His Son, Jesus the Christ. Jesus opened a new and living way for sinful mankind to come back to God (Hebrews 10:20).

This New Covenant completed all that God had planned. There is no need of anything more. The writer of Hebrews makes it clear to us. Jesus finished the work that God gave Him to do (John 17:4; 19:30). He came to earth to die for our sins. He obeyed His Father and God raised Him from death to be our Saviour.

The Old Covenant that God gave to Moses required the repeated sacrifice of blood from innocent animals to forgive sin. This commandment was fully

traditions' (Hebrews 13:9-10).

OFFERINGS TO GOD UNDER THE NEW COVENANT

Jesus offered His body to die on a cross outside the walls of Jerusalem. Crucifixion was the most shameful and painful kind of punishment. 'He suffered to make the people holy by sacrificing His own blood' (13:12).

We are made holy because Jesus sacrificed Himself for us. This is through the grace of God for all who believe in His salvation plan. Jesus is our Saviour. 'You were slain. And with Your blood You purchased for God people from every tribe and language and nation' (Revelation 5:9).

People watch us to see how little or how much we trust God and His salvation in Jesus. Will they see His holiness at work in our lives? Will they see Jesus in us?

Are we, too, willing to follow Jesus, live a holy life and suffer shame (Hebrews 13:13)? Are we even willing to die for Him?

A few years after the crucifixion of Jesus, the Romans destroyed Jerusalem. In this world we do not have cities that last forever (13:14). Instead, we look forward to a heavenly city. It is a Kingdom that cannot be destroyed.

Under the New Covenant, let us never stop our own personal offerings to God (13:15-16). These are the offerings that God desires:

- We offer to God our praises through Jesus our Saviour.
- With our lips we say that we believe in Him.
- We offer ourselves to be obedient to His will.
- We offer what we have and share it with others.

God is pleased with these offerings.

Also, we must offer ourselves to serve and obey our church leaders. 'Put yourselves under their authority. They keep watch over you. They know that they are responsible to God for everything they do. Obey them so that their work will be a joy. If you make their work a heavy load, it will not do you any good' (13:17). Therefore, encourage and support your leaders and do not weaken their ministry.

A REQUEST FOR PRAYERS

The writer of Hebrews then asks his readers to offer prayers for himself and his co-workers. They all wanted to do what was right. He says, 'We long to live as we should in every way' (13:18).

We too should pray for our brothers and sisters in Jesus Christ:

- Pray for the church leaders, teachers and preachers.



Now read this: Hebrews Chapter 13

ADVICE FOR HOLY LIVING

In this final chapter of Hebrews there are many words of advice for holy living:

- Verse 1. Love the family of God. 'Love each other as brothers and sisters.'
- Verse 2. Welcome strangers. 'Some people have welcomed angels without knowing it.'
- Verse 3. Do not forget the believers in prison. 'Remember those who are badly treated.'
- Verse 4. Live holy and pure lives. 'All of you should honour marriage... God will judge those who commit adultery. He will judge everyone who commits sexual sins.'
- Verse 5. 'Do not be controlled by love for money. Be happy with what you have.' Remember God promised, 'I will never leave you.' (Deuteronomy 31:6).



God judges sexual sins (Hebrews 13:4)

The Bible teaches that God blesses marriage between one man and one woman. Where it is possible, He wants both to enjoy making babies to produce each new generation. God judges men and women who want to enjoy sex outside of marriage. We must remain holy in our thoughts and desires.

Jesus said, 'Have you not read that in the beginning the Creator made them male and female?

That is why a man will leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife. The two will become one. They are no longer two, but one. So no one should separate what God has joined together' (Matthew 19:4-6.)

• Verse 6. Do not let fear destroy your peace. Say 'I will not be afraid' (Psalm 118:6,7).

• Verse 7. 'Remember your leaders who spoke the word of God to you. Copy their faith.'

• Verse 8. All around us things change. But Jesus never changes. 'Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever.'

Jesus has power to heal people and to give back life. Reach out to Him in faith for all your needs. He has promised to answer. (Mark 5:34.)

Our holiness is through the grace of God. He makes us strong to live holy lives. Our holiness is not through eating holy food. Our holiness is not through worshipping in holy places.

'Do not be carried away [deceived] by all kinds of strange teachings or

obeyed by the death of Jesus on the cross. The sacrifice of His innocent blood was the final sacrifice for all time. His resurrection from death completed the salvation plan of God. This opened the way for the amazing ministry of God's love through His Holy Spirit and His angels.

At the end of the first chapter, the writer of Hebrews explains the purpose of the angels of God. 'All angels are spirits who serve. God sends them to serve those who will receive [His] salvation' (Hebrews 1:14).



Talk about this:

1. From the beginning, God had one final plan for salvation. What was that?
2. Are you trusting in the salvation plan of God? How?
3. What did God tell us about His Son years before He was born on earth (1:2-13)?
4. What did God tell us about His angels (1:4,7,13-14)?



Think about this: Christians believe that Jesus is God. Jesus came to earth as the Son of God 2000 years ago. He was born to Mary in the form of a human being. He was both Son of God and Son of Man without sin. He became the perfect and final blood sacrifice for the sins and sinners of this world.



Now read this: Hebrews Chapter 2

A WARNING TO TAKE SALVATION SERIOUSLY

The writer of Hebrews warns us to follow carefully the great salvation plan of God. We must study the truth from God given to us in the Bible. 'Then we will not drift away from it' (2:1).

We read in the Old Testament that the believers were told to obey the message of God. Every time people broke the Law, they received the punishment that they deserved (2:2).

The writer of Hebrews asks, 'Then how will we escape [punishment] if we do not pay attention to God's great salvation?' (2:3). His salvation plan in Jesus used the punishment and death of Christ to pay for our sins. The sacrifice of His own Son on the cross paid for the forgiveness of God and our salvation. This is for all people who obey God and follow Jesus. This is the Good News of God in Jesus.

The Lord Jesus Christ Himself announced this salvation plan. Many heard it and received salvation through believing. Those who heard the Good News and believed it, passed on to us this message of salvation from God (2:3). We are now saved by faith in Jesus alone (Galatians 3:24-26).

God confirmed His salvation plan through Jesus by various miracles. 'He...

gave witness through the gifts of His Holy Spirit. He gave them as it pleased Him' (Hebrews 2:4). God gives to the Church these spiritual gifts to bring honour to His name and not to bring glory to men and women.

When we preach the Good News of Jesus, we should therefore expect signs and wonders from God. We must also remember that in the Last Days there will be false signs and wonders from the enemy (2 Thessalonians 2:9-11; 2 Timothy 4:3-4).

WHAT JESUS DID FOR THE FAMILY OF BELIEVERS

Long ago, God sent His angels to minister on earth (Hebrews 1:14). We believe that God still uses angels today. Angels, however, will not control the Kingdom of God that is to come when Jesus returns (2:5).

The writer of Hebrews quotes from Psalm 8:4-6 which looked forward to the coming of Jesus as Saviour. Jesus was made 'a little lower than the angels' for the thirty-three years of His life as a man (Hebrews 2:7,9). The Father sent His Son to be born as a man. Jesus gave up His majesty and glory in Heaven. He came down to suffer and to die for us (1 Peter 3:18).

Then God raised Jesus from death. Now, everything is under His control (Hebrews 2:8). Jesus is seated at the side of His Father in Heaven. God sends the angels to serve those who follow Him (1:14).

The writer of Hebrews also warns, 'We do not now see everything under His control' (2:8). Satan causes much trouble because he keeps trying to rule, but he fails. He longs to be in control of us. Even Christians are tempted to control people.

'We see Jesus ... given a crown of glory and honour... He suffered death. By the grace of God, He tasted death for everyone. That is why he was given His crown' (2:9).

Jesus was born to suffer and die for our sins. This was the amazing plan of God from the beginning. He acted in exactly the right way. He now brings His family of believers to share in His glory. God made Jesus the perfect One to do this through His sacrifice (2:10).



Hebrews 2:8. Who is in control?

- Jesus has all power and authority.
- He is seated at the right hand of the Lord God Almighty, His Father.
- Everything is under His control.
- We still see Satan and his evil spirits at work in the world around us.
- We also see sin in our own lives, which we confess to receive forgiveness.
- God allows Satan to continue to do evil. We are tested as Jesus was tested.
- When Jesus comes again, Satan will be bound up.

- We join with those who have been made perfect in Jesus.

Yes, we are the church of believers whose names are written in Heaven. We are a spiritual community. God knows all those whose names are written in His Book of Life. This is because we come through Jesus to God. He is the judge of all people. He brings us into the New Covenant. Jesus is our Great High Priest. He talks to His Father God for us (12:24).

DO NOT LET ANYTHING SPOIL YOUR CHRISTIAN LIFE

The Hebrew believers had left that old system of laws and priests. Jesus is the One who brings us to all the glories of His heavenly city. His sprinkled blood promises more than any other sprinkled blood sacrificed since the time of Cain and Abel. Therefore, do not say no to God. Do not turn away from the One who warns us from Heaven (12:25).

Do not reject or refuse to listen to God. He speaks to all of us through His written words of truth. He speaks to us through His Son. He is the Word of God (John 1:1-4). He calls you to live a holy life. No unholy person will see God (1 Corinthians 6:9-10). His voice is a loving voice. But we will learn to fear the voice of God if we live in sin or try to run away from Him. We cannot escape (Psalm 139:7-12; Hebrews 12:25).

Many things in this world will be shaken and taken from us. But the Kingdom of God will remain (12:27). 'We receive a kingdom that cannot be shaken. So let us be thankful. Then we can worship God in a way that pleases Him... Worship Him with deep respect and wonder' (12:28).

Is there anything in you that is not ready for fellowship with God in Heaven? Let the sacrifice of His Son on the cross destroy what is wrong in your life. The temptations and trials that come to all of us show us things that should be destroyed in our lives. These things include envy, bitterness, greed, selfishness, pride, deceit. Confess these sins and give them up. Let the holy fire of God destroy the things that hold you back in the great Christian race of life (12:29).

2. Who should we think about as our example (12:3)?
3. Why are troubles and trials important in life (12:5-11)?
4. What happens when we do not accept the discipline of God (12:8)?
5. Why do we need to make a clear pathway ahead of us in life (12:12-13)?
6. What important guidelines are given for church communities (12:15-17)?
7. What blessings does belief in Jesus provide for us (12:23-24)?



Think about this: How is God training you through the troubles of life? How does He show His love for you in good and bad times?

the Lord' (12:14). Long ago, God commanded His people to be holy.

We are not, however, saved by our good works, or even by trying to be holy (Ephesians 2:8–9). Believers are made holy and righteous through the gift of faith in God to forgive sins through Jesus. 'Their faith makes them right with God' (Romans 4:5).

In Hebrews 12:14-17 we are given these clear warnings:

- Try your best to live in peace with everyone.
- Try to be holy. Without holiness, no-one will see the Lord.
- Make sure that no-one fails to receive the grace of God. Help other people to receive His love and mercy.
- Do not allow bitterness to grow in the fellowship of believers. It will cause trouble and ungodliness.
- Make sure no-one commits sexual sins. This can destroy marriages and divide families and churches.
- Do not allow ungodly decisions to be made in the church. For example, Esau refused God's gift by selling his birthright for a plate of food. His life ended in tears (Genesis 25:33; 27:38).

These things warn us to be holy. If we fail, we must confess our sin to God, say we are sorry to Him and receive His forgiveness. We must then keep going forward on our journey of faith in the salvation plan of God through Jesus our Saviour. We can then serve God as holy people. We can then enter fully into the ministry He has called us to do.

A SPIRITUAL COMMUNITY AND KINGDOM

The Old Testament Law spoke about punishment, and even death for sin. But the cross of Jesus gives you life and victory over sin. There is no need to be sad or fearful when you trust in God. You have not come to the mountain of God that cannot be touched (Ex 19:12). You have not come to the fire of God, nor His darkness, nor His storm, nor His trumpet blast, nor His loud voice (12:18-19). Even Moses was afraid to go near to God at times (12:21).

Instead, through Jesus, we come to the city of the living God. It is the heavenly Jerusalem, where there are thousands of angels (12:22).

Those who believe in Jesus now join others who worship Him (12:23):

- We are the community or church of the people of God.
- We belong to a community where the only Son of God rules.
- We share in the blessings that belong to Jesus.
- Our names are written in Heaven.
- We are able to approach the Lord God Almighty.

Jesus is holy. He makes us holy through faith in His sacrifice. He will never be ashamed of us if we remain holy and faithful to Him (2:11). Therefore, we must never be ashamed to confess Jesus in our lives.

Jesus offers us all a place in the family of God. This was promised by God long ago in the Old Testament (2:12-13; Psalm 22:22; Isaiah 8:18).

WE ARE PART OF THE FAMILY OF GOD

Jesus became a human being like us in order to die for us. 'By doing that, He could destroy the one who rules over the kingdom of death [who is] the devil' (2:14).

Jesus overcame sin and death for us. He set us free from the fear of death (2:15). Jesus robbed Satan of the power he uses to enslave us. He has brought us from death to life (Romans 6:13). We are the children of God. Therefore, we have His power working in us when we are born again.

Jesus came to help the family of Abraham (Hebrews 2:16). He helps all those who share the faith of Abraham in our Lord God Almighty. He blesses all who obey Him as Abraham did (Genesis 12:1-4). If we believe in the Lord Jesus Christ, we are children of God. We receive what God promised Abraham (Galatians 3:29). God promised that the family of Abraham would be a blessing throughout the whole world for all who believe.

It was necessary for Jesus to serve God as a man. He served God as our kind and faithful Great High Priest. He came to earth as a baby to do this. In this way 'He could pay for the sins of the people by dying for them' (Hebrews 2:17). He could do this because He was the only one who never sinned.

The writer of Hebrews also reminds us that while Jesus was on earth, He was tempted and tested. Now He helps us to overcome our own temptations to sin (2:18). Jesus knows how to help others who are tempted by Satan.

2. What should we expect to happen when the Good News is preached (2:4)?
3. Why is there much trouble in the world today (2:8)?

5. Why is Jesus able to help us when we are tempted (2:18)?

Now read this: Hebrews Chapter 3

JESUS IS GREATER THAN MOSES

The writer continues to speak to his Hebrew brothers and sisters in Jesus Christ. He says that they are holy people. He says that they are the chosen people of God. He encourages all believers to keep thinking about Jesus. His message is for the Jews who believe that Jesus is their Messiah and Saviour. His message is also for followers of Jesus who are not Jews. Jesus is our Chief Apostle. Jesus is our Great High Priest. Jesus is the One whom we believe (3:1).

Moses was faithful to God and was a servant to the people. Jesus was faithful to God who sent Him as His Son (3:2). He did all that God asked Him to do. So Jesus is 'worthy of greater honour than Moses' (3:3). God is the builder of everything through Jesus, not through Moses (3:4).

Moses served God faithfully. He also spoke of God's plan of salvation to come (3:5). Jesus, however, is more worthy. He is the faithful Son of God He serves all the people of God. He is over the house of God. 'We are His house if we continue to come boldly to God' (3:6).

WARNINGS AND ENCOURAGEMENT

We therefore come boldly to the Lord God Almighty through faith in Jesus alone. We will prove the faithfulness of Jesus as we continue to seek God. We must hold on to our faith. We must hold on to the hope of our eternal salvation (3:6). We must not rebel against the salvation plan of God in Jesus. We must also leave behind religious traditions which are not part of the salvation plan of God.

The amazing history of Israel is also a warning to all the people of God. In Hebrews 3:7-11, the writer quotes from Psalm 95. This Psalm reminds us of the sad time in the history of Israel when the people of God rebelled against Him on the way to the Promised Land. It warns everyone: 'The Holy Spirit says, "Listen to His voice today. If you hear it, do not be stubborn"' (3:7-8).

God had many good things planned for the people of Israel. However, He took them through the desert so that He could speak to them.

The early believers in Jesus met together daily to worship God in the power of the Holy Spirit. They continued to learn from the Old Testament. So should we. The plan of God is to change the way we live and think. We should live therefore, not for ourselves, but for God and His people. As we do this, we honour God and others will see Jesus in us.

The writer of Hebrews goes on to say, 'Brothers and sisters, make sure that none of you has a sinful heart. Do not let an unbelieving heart turn you

The great men and women of faith around us encourage us not to look back. We must look ahead as we run the great race. 'Let us keep running the race [that God has] marked out for us. Let us keep looking to Jesus' (12:1-2). He began our journey of faith when we believed. This seed of faith will grow with the help of the Holy Spirit. He will make our faith perfect at the end.

Jesus suffered gladly the shame of the cross for us. He was able to suffer there because of the joy He would receive afterwards. Then He sat down at the right hand of God His Father (12:2).

Jesus suffered much for sinners. He did this to win the victory for us over sin and over the shame of sin. So think about Him and follow His example. Do not allow your faith to weaken when evil people say and do wrong things to you. Then you will not get tired or sad (12:3).

GOD TRAINS US THROUGH SUFFERING

The writer of Hebrews then encourages believers who are suffering because of their faith. 'You struggle [and fight] against sin. But you have not yet fought to the point of spilling your blood' (12:4). You have not suffered as Jesus did.

The writer then quotes words of hope from Proverbs 3:11-12. 'Think of the Lord's training as important. Do not lose faith and hope when He corrects you. The Lord trains those He loves' (Hebrews 12:5-6). God disciplines and corrects everyone He accepts as His child.

He loves us and waits for us to trust Him and obey Him. Therefore, learn from the hard times. God allows them to happen. He will use them to train you. He trains you as His children (12:7). If He does not train you then you are not truly His children (12:8).

God trains us better than our own parents. They did what they thought was best. God, however, wants us to share in His holiness (12:9-10).

All discipline and training seems painful. The training of God, however, produces holiness and also inner peace (12:11).

So lift up your weary arms and make your weak knees strong! Clear a pathway ahead for yourself. Be a good example and encourage other Christians. Then they will not stumble and hurt themselves. They will be strengthened by your example of preparing the way ahead. They will grow strong in their faith (12:12-13).

HOW TO BE HOLY IN ALL WE DO

The writer gives further encouragement and good advice. Good deeds and obedience to God are not enough to get us into Heaven. 'Try your best to live at peace with everyone. Try to be holy. Without holiness no-one will see

We will all be made perfect together with them (11:40). God promises something better for us all. This hope is made possible today through faith in God and through the death and resurrection of His Son the Lord Jesus Christ.



The great Christian race of life (Hebrews 12:1-3)

- Remember that many other Christians have run and won. Their faith witnesses to us what we and God can do.
- Prepare for the race. Throw off everything in life that hinders you from winning the prize.
- Live holy lives. Confess your sins now, including those sins that hold tightly to you.
- Believe that God has a plan for you. Believe that the route is marked out ahead for us.
- Run in faith. Keep your eyes on Jesus and not on the other runners.
- Start and finish with Jesus. His Spirit runs with us. Your life of faith began with Jesus. He will be there with you at the end of the race.
- Do not look behind you. Forget the failures of the old life. Jesus will make you perfect if you remain faithful to the end.
- Do not be afraid of problems ahead of you. In the race of life, you will meet many tests of faith. They will make you stronger.
- Trust in Jesus. He loves you. He ran the race before you.
- Do not grow weary. Remember that Jesus suffered much to win the victory that you can receive.

KEEP LOOKING TO JESUS

The names of the faithful men and women of God surround us like a great cloud (12:1). They are true witnesses of faith in God. Their faith reminds us and encourages us not to let anything hinder our own faith in God.

Christians are like runners in a great race. The writer of Hebrews tells us to throw off everything that hinders us. Runners throw off heavy clothes that stop them from winning in a race. We must also throw off anything in our lives that stops us growing in faith. 'Let us throw off any sin that holds on to us tightly' (12:1).

away from the living God. But build one another up [in the faith] every day. Do it as long as there is still time. Then none of you will become stubborn ... Hold firmly to the faith we had at first ... hold to it to the end' (3:12-14).

The writer quotes again the words from Psalm 95. 'Listen to the voice of God today. If you hear it, do not be stubborn' (3:15). God has many good things planned for us. But if we do not listen to God, it becomes more and more difficult to repent. We must not allow our hearts to become hard.

ENTERING THE PROMISED LAND

Moses led the Israelites to the edge of the Promised Land. However, they could not enter in because they rebelled against God. God chose Israel as His very own people. He rescued them from slavery in Egypt. Their clothes did not wear out in the desert. God sent them fresh food. But they were not thankful. They died in the desert. After 40 years, Joshua led their children into the Promised Land of Canaan (3:16-17).

They did not rejoice at the mighty works which God did to bring them out of Egypt. They did not trust His salvation plan for them. They marched through the desert and grumbled. No fresh water! No vegetables from Egypt! No cooking pots full of lamb and goat meat!

They rebelled against God and tested His patience. They proved that the more they grumbled, the harder their hearts became. They were stubborn and they hardened their hearts.

So their children entered the Promised Land instead and received the promises of God. God wanted to show mercy. He spoke to them very clearly in the wilderness. He wants to speak to all of us if we are ready to stop and listen.



Hebrews 3:12-15. Words of warning and encouragement

The writer of Hebrews warned the Jewish believers in Jesus not to go back to their old ways. His words also warn believers today:

- Brothers and sisters, make sure that none of you has a sinful heart.
- Do not let an unbelieving heart turn you away from the living God.
- Build each other up in the faith every day while there is time.
- Do not become stubborn. Do not become deceived or fooled.
- Hold firm to the faith in Jesus that you had at first. Hold it until the end.
- Listen to the voice of God. If you hear it, do not be stubborn.

These warnings are also great words of encouragement for us.

ENTERING INTO THE PROMISED REST OF GOD

So God did not allow a whole generation of His people to enter into the Promised Land of Canaan. They did not enjoy the rest that God had promised while they lived as slaves in Egypt (3:18). That was because they did not believe God's promise (3:19; Exodus 3:8). So they did not obey God. These two sins began with Adam and Eve (Genesis 3:6).

God, however, does not love us only when we obey Him. He loves us all the time. His love is always the same. His love is faithful. But if we do not stay close to Him, our love for Him will grow cold. If we do not trust Him, we will lose the blessings He offers. If we do not obey Him, we will lose the rest that God has planned for us (Hebrews 3:18). Continue to believe (3:1,19).

HOW TO RECEIVE GOD'S PROMISED REST

The writer of Hebrews says, 'God's promise of enjoying His rest stands [today]. Be careful that none of you fails to receive it' (4:1). God has never taken back His promise of rest for His people. Through Jesus, God promises to provide for us now and in the future. All the promises of God are fulfilled in Him. And through following the call of Jesus we find that promised rest of God. As Christians, we are called to hear and to believe and to obey His words. Leave behind the old life of slavery to sin and receive God's promise.

The words of God were given to the people of Israel in Egypt and in the desert. They heard the message of God. The truth they heard was, however, of no value to them. It was not received with faith (4:2). This angered God. But those who believe God enjoy His promised rest (4:3).

The psalmist said that God became angry with His people. Psalm 95:11 tells us how God warned them. 'God said, when I was angry ... I said they

- By faith, the **Israelites** escaped from Egypt across the Red Sea (11:29; Exodus 14:26-31). By faith, their children became the nation of Israel in the Promised Land of Canaan.
- By faith, **Joshua** and the people of Israel believed that the Promised Land of Canaan was for them to occupy. By faith, Joshua believed that the walls of Jericho would fall down after they marched round the city for seven days (11:30; Joshua 6:1-21).
- By faith, **Rahab** the prostitute was not killed in Jericho with those who rejected God (11:31). Instead, by faith, she took all her family into her house and they were saved from death (Joshua 6:22-25). She lived in Israel and became an ancestor of Boaz and King David and also of Joseph who married Mary, the mother of Jesus (Matthew 1:5-16).

The faith of these people of God still speaks to us today through the pages of the Old Testament (Hebrews 11:4). They lived by faith until they died. Many did not receive the things that God had promised. Instead, they looked forward to a heavenly country (11:16).

They did not understand the many parts of the plan of God. They trusted, however, that God would keep His promises. They lived and died in hope.

'THE WORLD WAS NOT WORTHY OF THEM'

The writer of Hebrews wanted to tell of all the other faithful people of God. He did not have time to tell about Gideon, Barak, Sampson, Jephthah, David, Samuel or the prophets (11:32). Some of these faithful men and women of God defeated kings and ruled fairly. Some received the blessings in this world that God promised. Some escaped death by lions. Others escaped death by fire or by the sword. Their weakness was turned to strength. They were powerful in battles. Some were raised from death.

Many suffered but they refused to deny their faith. They chose instead to suffer and die and be raised up to a better life after death (11:33-35). Some were laughed at and some were beaten. Others were put in chains in prison. Some were stoned and some were sawn in two. They were poor. They were attacked. They were badly treated. Some lived in caves or holes in the ground (11:36-38).

The world did not deserve such great and faithful people of God. The world was not worthy of them (11:38). But to God, they were worthy people. 'All these people were praised because they had faith' (11:39). No-one was worthy if they did not have faith in God.

The final result of all faith is victory. True faith stands firm in the trials of life. All these people had faith. Yet they did not all receive in this world what God had promised. God planned something far better for those who suffered for their faith. They received something that this world cannot offer.

-10). He believed God could give him and his wife a child in their old age (11:11-12). By faith, Abraham was willing to offer up his son Isaac as a sacrifice to God. It was the custom of the surrounding tribes at that time to sacrifice their first-born child to the gods. But the faith of Abraham looked beyond the sacrifice of his son, to a resurrected Isaac. He believed that the Lord God Almighty could bring Isaac back from death (11:17–19). God stopped Abraham from killing Isaac and provided an animal sacrifice instead. God promised Abraham, 'Your family will continue through Isaac' (Genesis 21:12). 'All nations on earth will be blessed because of your children. All this will happen because you have obeyed Me' (Genesis 22:18).

- By faith, **Isaac** blessed his twin sons Jacob and Esau. He told them what God had planned for them (Hebrews 11:20). God changed the name of Jacob to Israel (Genesis 35:9-10). Isaac had faith that God would fulfil every promise He had made to his father Abraham. He believed the promise would be fulfilled through the children of Jacob (Israel). This promise of God brought blessing to Jewish people and also to non-Jewish people.
- By faith, **Jacob (Israel)** blessed all his twelve sons because He believed the promise of God for them. He also blessed his two grandsons, the sons of Joseph, when he was dying (Hebrews 11:21). Jacob saw beyond the time that his family lived in Egypt, to a land where God would bless them. He was old, but trusted in the promise of God for a special nation and land in Canaan for the people of Israel (Genesis 48). This was the same promise made to Abraham and Isaac.
- By faith, **Joseph** spoke about the escape of the people of Israel from Egypt. He even gave instructions where to place his bones in the promised land of Canaan (11:22; Genesis 50:24-25).
- By faith, **Jochebed** hid her baby Moses from the king's men in Egypt (11:23). After three months, she put him in a basket and floated it on the River Nile. She did this in faith, trusting God would protect him and the people of Israel (Exodus 2:1-10).
- By faith, **Moses** refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter (Hebrews 11:24). By faith, he chose to suffer with the people of Israel rather than live a rich but sinful life (11:25-26). By faith, Moses left Egypt, trusting in the invisible God (11:27). By faith, Moses returned and kept the Passover. By faith, he told the people of Israel to sprinkle the blood of a lamb above their doorways. By faith he believed that they would not be destroyed by God's angel of death (11:28). By faith, he believed that God would save the Israelites from slavery in Egypt (11:29; Exodus 12:21-28).

will never enjoy the rest I planned for them' (Hebrews 4:3,5). The love of God for them had not changed. Nor had His purpose changed for them (Exodus 19:6). Their problem was their cold hearts. Their lack of faith caused them to disobey God and not receive His promised rest.

God Himself rested on the seventh day of creation (Hebrews 4:4; Genesis 2:2). He finished His work of creating the world. Many do enjoy His rest today. It is still open to us all. Some people, however, receive the Good News of Jesus but then they do not obey God (Hebrews 4:6). They disobey because they do not fully believe and lose the promised rest of God (3:18).

A weak faith could affect anyone. It leads to unbelief. Unbelief leads to sin and separation from God. It cuts us off from the mercy of God to save us from sin. Without faith, we lose the power to overcome sin and are no longer holy.

Today, those who believe the Good News of Jesus must go on in that faith to enjoy the promised rest of God. We must stop trusting in our own works. Rather, we must do the work God has called us to do.

After Moses died, Joshua led the people into the Promised Land of Canaan. However, they only had a temporary rest from trouble. The writer of Hebrews warns his readers a third time using the words from Psalm 95. 'Listen to His voice today. If you hear it, do not be stubborn' (4:7). 'Today' means 'now'. So we must believe and obey in order to receive the promised rest of God through His plan of salvation in Jesus alone.

The people of Israel disobeyed God because they did not fully believe Him. After Moses died, Joshua was unable to give them the true rest of God (4:8). It is, however, available to us today. The Bible calls it the Sabbath rest (4:9). 'So let us make every effort to enjoy the rest Then no-one will fall into sin by following the example of those who do not obey God' (4:11).

JESUS IS OUR GREAT HIGH PRIEST

The meaning and truth of the Word of God written in the Old Testament has not changed. This is because God does not change. His words are not dead words. The words that God speaks are living and active. They are full of power and sharper than any sword or knife with two edges (4:12). His words from the whole of the Bible cut deep into us today.

The words of God open up our soul, our spirit, our body, our thoughts and our plans. God knows everything that we say or think. 'Nothing God created is hidden from Him. His eyes see everything. He will hold us responsible for everything we do' (4:13).

The writer of Hebrews then reminds his readers that Jesus is our Great High Priest. He is the Son of God and is now in Heaven. 'So let us hold firmly to what we say we believe' (4:14).

The Hebrew believers who read these words faced many trials. They suffered much. The writer of Hebrews told them that they must not grow weary or weak in faith. Nor must their suffering hinder their service for God. They now had a Great High Priest, Jesus, who also suffered for them. He understood their suffering and would help them.

Jesus was tested and tempted but He never sinned. He knows, however, what it feels like to be tempted when we are weak or hurting (4:15; Matthew 26:39).

These Hebrew believers needed help. So the writer pointed them to the grace of God under the New Covenant. Through Jesus, we are able to come to the Lord God Almighty. 'So let us come boldly to the throne [of God which is a throne] of grace. Then we will receive mercy. We will find grace to help us when we need it' (4:16). God asks us to come to Him with confidence. He shows us His loving and saving grace. His mercy helps us in times of need.

So come boldly to God in prayer. Come to Him as a believer, not as a beggar. Then you will receive the mercy of God. Then you will see the wonderful grace of God. Then you will be free to enjoy His Sabbath rest.

THE WORK OF THE HIGH PRIEST OF ISRAEL

In the past, every high priest was chosen from men. He offered worship gifts and sacrifices for sin (5:1). He acted for everyone in all things to do with God. Under the Law of Moses, the high priest entered the holy presence of God in the Tabernacle once a year. There, he offered sacrifices for the sins of

His promises to them. Their faith looked forward in hope.

When He lived on earth, Jesus spoke of that great day when He will come again, when all the promises of God will be fulfilled. He asked, 'When the Son of Man comes, will He find people on earth who have faith?' (Luke 18:8).

What is faith? Faith is being sure of what we hope for, but cannot see (Hebrews 11:1). It is not easy to believe in things we cannot see or feel. True faith reaches out to God. True faith believes He exists. And true faith rewards those who search for Him. The faith that God wants is that we trust Him for our life and for our future.

So it is by faith that we believe God created the heavens and the earth from things that cannot be seen (11:3). This is the foundation of our faith. The universe has an amazing Designer and Creator (Romans 1:20). We must have faith to believe what God says in the Bible is true. There is no evidence here for other ideas about how the world or mankind were created.

By faith, we please God through believing He exists. By faith we can then come close to Him. By faith we hear and believe the Good News of salvation in Jesus. By faith we can then choose to believe in Jesus. 'Without faith it is not possible to please God' (Hebrews 11:6). By faith we receive His salvation and the hope of eternal life with our Lord God Almighty.

THE GREAT MEN AND WOMEN WHO LIVED BY FAITH

The writer of Hebrews then tells us about some of the believers in God from the Old Testament. These men and women lived by faith and died in hope. By faith, these people believed the things God promised.

- By faith, **Abel** offered God a better sacrifice than Cain (11:4). Abel sacrificed an animal and brought what God asked for. But Cain disobeyed God. He rejected the chosen plan of God to save mankind from sin. He rejected the sacrifice of innocent blood (Genesis 4:5).
- By faith, **Enoch** pleased God and was taken up to Heaven without dying (Heb. 11:5). No-one can please God without faith. Enoch lived a life of faith. He received the reward of God of eternal life (Genesis 5:24).
- By faith, **Noah** built an ark to save his family (Hebrews 11:7). Noah believed God's words of warning and obeyed His command. Noah's ark took him and his sons many years to build. God used the faith of Noah to save creatures and mankind from total destruction. After the flood, by faith, Noah sacrificed the blood of animals and birds in a burnt offering to God. This was pleasing to God at that time (Genesis 8:21).
- By faith, **Abraham** obeyed God. He left his comfortable city life and lived by faith. He trusted in God by living in tents in the land of Canaan. This was the land God chose for the future family of Abraham (Hebrews 11:8).

or three witnesses (10:28). Think how much more terrible the punishment will be for those who reject the Son of God or insult the Holy Spirit (10:29). 'It is a terrible thing to fall into the hands of the living God' (10:31).

Instead, remember the time when you received the truth and light of God (10:32). It was this truth that set you free (John 8:32). The writer reminds his readers that they stood firm in their faith in times of trouble. Some were laughed at. Some were persecuted. Some were put in prison. Some had their property taken from them. They accepted these things with joy. They knew God had promised them much more in the future (10:33-34).

You may have suffered persecution for your faith. But do not give up! 'So do not throw away your bold faith' (10:35). Keep faithful in order to do the will of God (10:36). God will reward you (Romans 8:28).

The writer of Hebrews reminds his reader of the words of the Old Testament prophet Habakkuk. He urged the people not to fear. He told them to live by faith (Hebrews 10:38; Habakkuk 2:3). Why should I fear?

We too must not be among those who go back to our old ways. 'We are people who believe and are saved' (Hebrews 10:39). We are among those who have a great hope. We are like the great faithful men and women of God who are described in the next chapter of the book of Hebrews. They were neither weak in faith nor disobedient towards God.

Today, many people think they can disobey God and nothing bad will happen to them. Do not be fooled. Yes, God's grace and mercy is freely given through Jesus if we obey. But the Day of Judgment will certainly come.

Now read this: Hebrews Chapter 11

FAITH AND HOPE IN THINGS WE CANNOT SEE

Chapter 11 of Hebrews reminds us of people of great faith. The writer gives us a list of faithful Old Testament men and women. They looked forward to a reward they could not actually see. All these people waited for God to fulfil

the people. God accepted the blood of innocent animals as payment for the sins of the nation.

In this way, high priests helped believers to get right with God. The high priest gently helped those who strayed away from God by mistake (5:2). The high priest was not perfect. He, too, was weak through sin. He, too, made mistakes. This is why the high priest of Israel had to offer sacrifices for his own sins (5:3).

No one took the honour of high priest himself. He was chosen and appointed by God (5:4). At the right time God chose His own Son as our Great High Priest. Jesus did not take the glory of becoming a high priest for Himself (5:5).

Jesus is our perfect High Priest without sin. He is our Great High Priest because He is the Son of God. The writer of Hebrews quoted from the Old Testament (5:6). 'You are My Son ... I am your Father' (Psalm 2:7). Also, Jesus would live as a priest forever pleading and praying for them (Hebrews 7:25). He is the Great High Priest in the order of Melchizedek who was a high priest and king at the time of Abraham (Psalm 110:4).



Hebrews 5:6,10. Who was Melchizedek?

Melchizedek was a high priest of the Lord God Almighty (Genesis 14:18). His name means King of Righteousness. He lived at the time of Abraham. Melchizedek was high priest and king of Salem, now called Jerusalem. He lived a long time before the laws about priests were given to Moses. He lived nearly 500 years before Moses led Israel, the chosen people of God. He lived nearly 1000 years before David was king of Israel in Jerusalem. He lived nearly 2000 years before the birth of Jesus and his crucifixion in Jerusalem. The Jews believe Melchizedek lives forever with God.

The writer of Hebrews says that Jesus is in the pattern or order of Melchizedek. Jesus is not in the priestly line of Aaron. He is in the line of Judah. He is also in the line of King David. Jesus is greater than high priest Melchizedek. He is greater than King David. He is the Son of God. He is perfect and without sin. He came as a human being to suffer and die for the sins of the world. He now offers salvation for all believers in all ages. His personal sacrifice was the final sacrifice of blood for sinners. This was the final plan of God from the beginning of time and forever. Jesus is our Great High Priest. He lives forever, just like Melchizedek (Psalm 110:4). One day soon, Jesus will return from Heaven to Jerusalem and rule on earth (Acts 1:11).

THE FINAL WORK OF JESUS, OUR GREAT HIGH PRIEST

The high priest offered up sacrifices for the sins of himself and the people. But Jesus offered Himself as the perfect sacrifice to pay for our sins. He suffered with cries and tears (5:7).

Jesus prayed for strength to do the will of His Father (Luke 22:42-44). God heard Jesus but it was necessary for Him to suffer and die for our sins. When this was finished, God raised Him up from death on the third day (Acts 10:40).

Jesus was and is the Son of God. By suffering, Jesus learned what it truly means to obey His Father God (Hebrews 5:8). We, too, can learn through suffering when obeying His call.

Jesus obeyed God and died for the sins of the world. God then raised Him from death that all who believe in Him will have everlasting life (John 3:16). Through Jesus comes eternal salvation. He saves all who follow Him and obey Him (Hebrews 5:9).

God appointed Jesus and He is accepted in Heaven as the last high priest. His sacrifice was the final work of salvation and will last forever. He is the Great High Priest for Jewish and non-Jewish believers. He is in the pattern or order of Melchizedek who was the high priest in Jerusalem 2000 years before Jesus (5:10).

Today, it is 2000 years after the death and resurrection of Jesus. The perfect and final sacrifice of His own blood enables Him to bring all believers into the presence of the Lord God Almighty. And He still performs the work of a Great High Priest. He is seated at God's right hand and pleads for us (7:25; 1 John 2:1). He is our Messiah or Saviour.

A WARNING TO GROW UP

The writer of Hebrews tells us that Jesus is greater than all the angels. He is greater than all the prophets. He is greater than all the high priests. He is greater than all the kings. He is greater than all of the leaders appointed by God in the Old Testament. The writer then suddenly stops to give a warning to all his readers and listeners. He says that there are many more things to tell them but they are too slow to understand (5:11).

Christians need help and encourage-

faithful' (Hebrews 10:23). If we do not come close to God often, we will begin to lose our faith. Soon we might stop serving the Lord, or even stop meeting together.

The writer therefore encourages us to serve other believers (10:24-25). Think about this. To grow in faith in God, Christians need to encourage other believers in their faith. This means that we ourselves grow in faith as we help others to grow in faith. Therefore:

- Care for others with godly love.
- Encourage others to do good deeds.
- Do not give up meeting together.
- Encourage others with words of hope.
- Act in faith more and more to fulfil the promises of God.
- Live waiting for the return of Jesus.

This also means that we should:

- Grow together in reading and understanding the Word of God.
- Spend time with others in prayer.
- Meet together to worship.
- Serve God together, seeking Him for the work He has for you to do.

Note that God does not do any of these things for us. Paul warns us to take off the old sinful ways and put on the good ways of salvation through Jesus. Then as we help others to stay faithful to God, He will keep His promise to bless us. Remember always that 'the One who promised is faithful' (10:23).

Christians meet together in large or small groups all over the world. It does not matter how big or small your group is. You should encourage and increase the faith of others. In this way, you will honour God and receive His blessing for yourself.

A WARNING NOT TO LOSE FAITH

Walk by faith every day. Pray believing that God hears and answers prayer. Trust the Holy Spirit to tell you of any sin that stops you from coming close to God.

What if we deliberately keep sinning even when we know the truth (10:26)? Then we fail to hate the sin in our lives. Sin always harms us in some way and often it harms others. Sin always separates us from God. If you try not to sin but fail, try again – and again. God understands you.

If we disobey God, we refuse His offer to forgive our sins through Jesus. 'All we can do is to wait in fear for God to judge' (10:27).

Those who rejected the Law of Moses died through the testimony of two

(Ephesians 1:4).

WE ARE MADE HOLY TO COME CLOSE TO GOD

The writer of Hebrews quotes again from the Old Testament prophet Jeremiah (Hebrews 10:15-17; Jeremiah 31:33-34).

- God will make a New Covenant with His people.
- The laws of God will be written on their hearts and in their minds.
- God will not remember their sins any more.

The Holy Spirit confirms these things (Hebrews 10:15). For those who are forgiven, there is now no need of sacrifices for sin (10:18).

Because of this great work of God for us, we have confidence in our salvation. We can now enter boldly into the presence of God by the blood of Jesus (10:19). This way to God is now open to all. The way is now open through the Temple curtain to meet God (10:20).

This was a shock to some Jewish believers. They knew that no-one was allowed into the holiest place in the Temple apart from the high priest of Israel. Before Jesus died, no-one else could enter the holiest place. A big curtain shut them out. When Jesus died, however, that curtain was torn open from top to bottom (Matthew 27:51). His death destroyed this barrier that separated people from God. It opened the way for all believers to meet God and to see His glory. Now, because Jesus is our perfect Great High Priest, all believers can come freely into the presence of God.

We can come into the presence of God without fear. 'So let us come near to God with an honest and true heart. Let us come near with a faith that is sure and strong' (Hebrews 10:22).

God has made us clean by the blood of His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ. Now we can have fellowship with Him. This was the plan of God from the beginning. It is a plan of love, grace and mercy.

How can we be so bold? It is not because we are good enough. It is not because we have done the best we can. We are sinful and unable to save ourselves. But we come boldly into the presence of God by the blood of Jesus that takes away our sin. We are washed clean from both sin and guilt (10:22). We then receive the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives. Believe it!

The purpose of God is for us to be holy (Ephesians 1:4). This happens through Jesus alone. There is no other way to come close to God as holy people who are set free from sin (Romans 3:24; Ephesians 2:8).

HOW TO GROW IN FAITH

We can trust in the promise of God for salvation through Jesus. We must, however, hold firm to our faith and hope in Him. 'The One who promised is

ment to grow and to understand the words from God. Those who do not grow in understanding go backwards in their faith.

The writer found it difficult to teach the Hebrew believers. We can sense the love and sadness in the heart of the writer. He says that they are slow to learn. 'By this time you should be teachers. But in fact, you need someone to teach you all over again. You still need the simple truths of God's word. You still need milk, not solid food' (5:12). Therefore, believers are warned not to fall away from their faith.

Paul wrote similar words to the church at Corinth. He said, 'You are not growing like Christ wants you to. You are still like babies. The words I spoke to you were like milk, not like solid food. You were not ready for solid food. And you still are not ready for it' (1 Corinthians 3:1-3).

We learn simple but important truths at the time we are saved. We must, however, grow in faith and knowledge of God. Believers must feed their minds with the truth from God. The writer of Hebrews says, 'Anyone who lives on milk is still a baby' (Hebrews 5:13).

They could not stay as spiritual babies. These Jewish believers in Jesus had not grown up. They were not strong in their faith. They did not want to learn about living the right way. So they were told to eat the solid food that is for those who are grown up (5:14).

The Hebrew believers were like infants who did not know the difference between right and wrong. They did not understand the teachings on the righteousness of God. They needed to grow up. But they behaved like people who did not want to learn more. They were lazy or found other things to do.

DISCIPLINE IN READING, PRAYING AND SERVING

Christians who feed only on milk do not discipline themselves to study the words of God in the Bible. If we are not eager to please God, we will not grow in knowledge and faith. Jeremiah the prophet said these words from God. 'Call out to Me... Pray to Me. And I will listen to you. When you look for Me with all your heart, you will find Me' (Jeremiah 29:12-13).


God cannot help us to grow up without us doing our part. We need training to tell the difference between good and evil. And we need to ask for the wisdom of the Holy Spirit to understand the important teachings of Jesus. Every day we need to pray and to study the truth from God in the Bible. We need also to gain the experience of serving and helping others to know more of the truth from God and His righteousness.

 **Now read this: Hebrews Chapter 6**

DO NOT NEGLECT THE TEACHINGS OF GOD

The writer of Hebrews invites all believers to learn more teachings of the Christian faith. He says, 'Let us grow up as believers' (6:1).

The writer then describes six simple teachings about Jesus. These wonderful basic teachings change lives. 'They taught us that we need to turn away from doing things that lead to death' (6:1-2).

1. **Repentance and faith** in God through Jesus for our total salvation from sin.
2. A **new beginning** in life through **baptisms** by water and by the Spirit.
3. The powerful gifts of the Holy Spirit passed on to believers through the **laying on of hands**.
4. The promise of **eternal life** through the resurrection of Jesus and our own new birth.
5. The warning of the **judgment of God** for all, that **lasts for ever**. 'If God allows, we will go beyond these teachings and grow up' (6:3). Many, however, who know these good things of God do not go on in the faith (6:4).

The writer does not go on to teach about the spiritual gifts or the importance of communion. Instead, the writer warns them not to fall away.

It would be a terrible thing for someone to reject their salvation. It would not be possible for us to bring them to repent (6:4,6).

- These people saw the light of Jesus (6:4).
- They shared in Holy Spirit power (6:4).
- They received blessings from God and His word (6:5).
- They saw the powers promised for them in the future (6:5).

The writer warns them again not to fall away from the faith (6:6). If they refuse to turn from their sins, it is not possible to bring them back. God watches them crucify His Son all over again. That brings shame on Him and His Church.

The Old Testament Law was only a shadow of things to come (Hebrews 10:1). The blood sacrifices were not perfect and had to be repeated (10:2). The sacrifices were repeated year after year but could not take away the guilt of sin. It was impossible for the blood of bulls, lambs and goats to take away sins for all time (10:4). Only the blood of Jesus was able to do that.

The animal sacrifices pointed the way forward to the perfect sacrifice that Jesus made for us on the cross. The writer quotes words of prophesy from King David in Psalm 40:6–8. A thousand years before Jesus was born his words told us what Jesus would say to His heavenly Father. 'You did not want sacrifices and offerings. You were not pleased with burnt offerings and sin offerings... God, I have come to do what You want' (Hebrews 10:5-7).

Through these words, David prophesied that a future Messiah would come to totally fulfil God's plan of salvation. God required a perfect sacrifice for sin. There was no perfect man on earth, because all people have the sinful nature of Adam and Eve. God accepted the sacrifice of His own sinless Son for the salvation of all who believe in Him.

Jesus therefore came down from Heaven and was born without sin to Mary (Luke 1:30-33). He lived a perfect life. He loved and obeyed His Heavenly Father (John 15:10; Hebrews 10:9).

WE ARE MADE HOLY THROUGH JESUS

When we sin, we do not deserve the love and mercy of God. When we confess and repent our sins, He is faithful and gives us His free forgiveness and salvation. We call this the grace of God.

God set aside the Old Covenant with its laws and sacrifices. He established a New Covenant of grace through the blood of Jesus (10:9).

God will never again accept the Old Covenant sacrifices for sin. Now He accepts the sacrifice of His Son. We can therefore come to God through Jesus (John 14:6). We are made holy before God because Jesus sacrificed His own body for our sins. When we believe and repent, we become holy through this salvation plan of God. It is what He wanted (Hebrews 10:10). And we can now receive this forgiveness at any time anywhere in the world. We do not need to visit special religious buildings to get right with God.

Jesus now sits at the right hand of God (10:12). There, 'He waits for them to be put under His control' (1:13; 10:13).

Meanwhile, the sacrifice of Jesus makes all believers holy and righteous. His sacrifice completes the purpose of God for us forever. The sacrifice of Jesus begins a work of holiness in the lives of those who are called and saved (10:14).

The apostle Paul said God chose us and called us to be holy and free from sin (2 Corinthians 6:17). This was because of the love of God for us

wine at communion. We do this to remember His death until He returns.

Jesus will come again a second time. 'At that time, He will not suffer for sin. Instead, He will come to bring salvation to those who are waiting for Him' (9:28).

Satan tries very much to ruin the lives of people. The Holy Spirit, however, shines the light of the truth from God into the lives of believers today. This brings freedom from sin plus salvation in Jesus, God's Messiah or Christ.

Think about this: Jesus took the punishment that we deserve upon Himself. He suffered and died for our sins to be forgiven. He also removes the guilt of sinning.



Now read this: Hebrews Chapter 10

JESUS, THE PERFECT SACRIFICE

In the first half of this chapter, the writer explains again the purpose of the sacrifice of Jesus:

1. His sacrifice was the perfect sacrifice for God to forgive our sins.
2. His sacrifice provided everything necessary for our salvation.
3. His punishment for our sins brings forgiveness to believers for all time.
4. His death was for us. He died in our place. He took the punishment that we deserve.

The writer of Hebrews repeats this message to the Jewish believers. He wants their minds and their hearts to be changed. He wants them to know that the Old Covenant laws on sacrifices for sin have been replaced. The laws of Temple sacrifices were not perfect. They covered over but did not remove sin. Therefore, they could not make perfect the people who came to the Temple to worship God (10:1).

We, too, must leave behind the old life. We are saved through the New Covenant sacrifice of Jesus.

In order to be saved, God does not ask us to do anything except believe, repent and receive His forgiveness through what His Son did for us. 'Believe in the Lord Jesus. Then you and your family will be saved' (Acts 16:31).

These people read and understood the truth from God in the Old Testament. They knew the teachings and miraculous powers of Jesus and His apostles. Some, however, were falling away from the faith. Other believers put their faith in the man-made religious systems and traditions. They did not trust in the power of the death and resurrection of Jesus.

Many Bible verses remind us that God cares for those who continue to trust His plan for their salvation and eternal life (John 5:24). To continue to taste these blessings of God, we must not weaken our faith in Jesus who is our salvation. Therefore, if we continue in sin and do not repent, we lose everything (Hebrews 6:6). But the writer speaks of 'better things'.

TWO DIFFERENT LIVES

The writer then talks about two different lives: a healthy life and a sick life. He compares this to two different soils.

Rain from God falls on good and bad soil. Good soil produces good crops. It is useful land and receives the blessings of God (6:7). Bad soil produces only weeds which are destroyed (6:8).

A healthy life receives the truth from God. It receives the truth and gives good fruit. A life that does not receive the truth is unfruitful.

Too often, we allow the old life to get in the way of our new life in Jesus. Our salvation through Jesus should make our lives fruitful for God (Galatians 5:22-23). The writer of Hebrews wanted to see 'better things' in the life of his readers (Hebrews 6:9). This comes through the power of the Holy Spirit producing fruit within us. God will never forget the love you show to Him and to others. Do not give up loving Him and helping others (6:10).

Be faithful and keep living in hope to the end (6:11). 'We do not want you to slow down. Instead, be like those who have faith and are patient. They will receive what God promised' (6:12).

THE PROMISE OF GOD IS CERTAIN AND IS FOR ALL

When God made His promise to Abraham, He said, 'I will certainly bless you and give you many children' (6:13-14; Genesis 22:17). His purpose was to bless the family of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob (Israel). He then blessed the world through Jesus, the Son of God, who came as the Messiah, the Saviour of the people of Israel.

The promise of God to send a Saviour is written many times in the Old Testament. God kept His promise when Jesus was born in Israel 2000 years ago. Jesus came as a man to this world to be the Saviour of all those who believe in Him.

The faithful promises of God are a good reason not to give up. Be patient to receive fully the promises of God for yourself. 'Abraham was patient while

he waited. Then he received what God promised him' (6:15). So we have a good reason not to give up. Leave the old life behind and take hold of the hope offered to us in the promises of God (6:18). All the promises of God through Jesus are for us who are His own (2 Corinthians 1:22).

Our hope in God is certain (Hebrews 6:19). Jesus opened for us a way to be with our Lord God Almighty (6:20). He became priest and king just like Melchizedek.

Therefore, our hope is in Jesus Christ, God's promised Saviour. He is our Great High Priest forever. As the Lamb of God, He has gone ahead of us into Heaven. He offered His own blood on our behalf. His sacrifice was the final sacrifice of blood for our salvation. He is the sacrificial Lamb of God.

Every tribe and family and language will be blessed by this Good News. 'Salvation belongs to our God ... and to the Lamb' (Rev. 7:10). Abraham's faith was in God's promise and God provided salvation in Jesus (Romans 4:23-25).

Now read this: Hebrews Chapter 7

MELCHIZEDEK, THE ANCIENT PRIEST OF GOD

The writer of Hebrews talks again about the king and high priest Melchizedek. The Old Testament tells us that Melchizedek served the Lord God Almighty, who created the world. We know very little about him. He lived in Salem, which is Jerusalem (Genesis 14:18-20). He met Abraham and blessed him (Hebrews 7:1). Abraham gave Melchizedek a tenth of everything he gained from wars with his enemies (7:2,6).

The name Melchizedek means king of righteousness. He was king of

sacrificing His own blood. This was the perfect plan of God for all time for the salvation of all who believe.

When Jesus sacrificed His life, the old system of priests came to an end. 'Jesus came as the Great High Priest of the good things that are now here' (9:11). 'He did it once, and for all time. His own blood paid the price to set us free from the power of sin for ever' (9:12,26).

After centuries of animal sacrifices, God sent down from Heaven His perfect sacrifice for sin. He offered His own Son as the sacrifice (9:12). Jesus was perfect, without fault. Therefore, by faith in Him, our lives are made clean from sins that deserve death. His blood also washes away the feelings of guilt. We are set free from the power of sin and guilt. 'Now we can serve the living God' (9:14).

JESUS SETS US FREE FROM SIN

Jesus is now the mediator of a New Covenant (9:15). He talks to His Father about us. He brings us to God. God looks at us and accepts that we are holy. We are forgiven because of the sacrifice of His precious Son. Jesus said, just before He died on the cross, 'It is finished' (John 19:30). Jesus finished God's plan of salvation for all who repent and believe. We have been set free from sin to receive forgiveness, salvation and eternal life.

From the beginning of the world, God accepted the sacrifice of innocent blood (Genesis 4:4-5; 8:20). This was necessary for sins to be forgiven (Hebrews 9:22). Without a blood sacrifice, no-one can be forgiven. Without a blood sacrifice, there is no covenant between God and mankind.

The sacrifice of animal blood cost the high priest nothing. The sacrifice of Jesus cost Him everything. He did it for us. He then entered Heaven to be there for us in the presence of God. He lives there now (9:24).

Jesus came and died to destroy the power of sin by sacrificing Himself. There was no other way to forgive the sinner and to remove the sin. Jesus did this only once. Sacrifices made under the Old Testament Law were not perfect and had to be repeated every year (9:25). The work of Jesus on the cross is complete for all who believe. It is for all time (John 19:28-30).

This work of Jesus is the New Covenant with God. The laws of God are now written in our hearts (Hebrews 8:10; Jeremiah 31:33). The Old Covenant sacrifices are finished. Not long after the book of Hebrews was written, the Roman armies destroyed Jerusalem and its Temple. This happened in AD 70. This ended the sacrifice of animals.

Yes, Jesus came only once to destroy sin for all time (Hebrews 9:26). He came first to the Jews, the people of Israel. Then through His disciples to the rest of the world (Acts 1:8, Mark 16:15-16). Jesus now takes away the sins of many people (9:28). We remember this each time we take the bread and

blood of the New Covenant... It is poured out for many' (Mark 14:24). This promise is for all people who believe in Him as Saviour.

2. Where is Jesus ministering for us now? What does He do there?
3. How is the New Covenant better than the Old Covenant (8:6)?
4. What did Jeremiah prophecy about the New Covenant (8:8-12)?

Now read this: Hebrews Chapter 9

WORSHIP IN THE TABERNACLE OF GOD

This chapter tells how the people of God worshipped in the Tabernacle under the Old Covenant (9:1-10). The writer describes the work of the priests and the high priest (9:6-7). Blood sacrifices and offerings were required under the Old Testament Law (9:7).

The animal sacrifices, however, did not remove the guilt of the sinner. The sacrifices did not enable sinners to live a holy life (9:9). They sacrificed the blood of animals again and again to be forgiven. There were also rules for food, drink and washing (9:10).

JESUS PAID THE PRICE FOR OUR SIN

God gave these laws until the time of the New Covenant (9:10). Today, God still forgives all who obey Him and who confess, repent and accept Jesus as Saviour. This is possible through the sacrifice of the blood of Jesus, the Lamb of God.

The writer then explains again to the Hebrews the purpose of God in Jesus. Under the New Covenant, Temple worship and sacrifices are no longer necessary to forgive sin. The death of Jesus replaces the animal sacrifices on the altar. His death replaces the sprinkling of animal blood on the Ark of the Covenant. The blood of animals can never make a person clean and holy.

Many think of Jesus as a great teacher and prophet. Others say He was just an example for us to follow. He was all of these and much more. He is the promised Messiah or Christ. He came to destroy the power of sin by

Salem which means peace (7:2). Salem became known as Jerusalem. Melchizedek was priest and king. The Jews believed that the coming Messiah would also be priest and king. Melchizedek is a mysterious person who has no beginning and no end. They believed that he remains a priest for ever, just like the Son of God (7:3).

Melchizedek gave Abraham the blessing of God. He was therefore more important than Abraham (7:6-7). No one was greater than Melchizedek and Abraham until Jesus came.

The high priest Melchizedek lived before Aaron and the priests of Levi (7:10). (See extra notes for Hebrews Chapter 5.) The writer of Hebrews wanted to make it clear to his Jewish readers that Melchizedek was not a high priest from the tribe of Levi and Aaron. He was greater than them. Nor is Jesus from the tribe of Levi and Aaron (7:14). He was born to Mary whose husband was from the tribe of Judah (Matthew 1:2,16; Luke 3:23,30)

JESUS IS GREAT HIGH PRIEST OF A NEW COVENANT

Jesus is a priest who lives forever, as Melchizedek lives forever (7:3,17). The rules, however, about the priests and sacrifices have come to an end (7:18). This is because of the sacrifice of the blood of Jesus. There is now a better way to God through the final sacrifice of Jesus our Great High Priest (7:19). God promised this New Covenant for our salvation through Him (7:22).

Jesus gave many examples of life under the New Covenant. These are written down in Matthew chapters 5 to 7. 'Jesus makes the promise of a better covenant certain' (Hebrews 7:22).

Jesus said, 'Do not think that I have come to destroy what is written in the [Old Testament] Law or in the Prophets... I have come to give full [and correct] meaning to what is written' (Matthew 5:17).

The Old Covenant provided a relationship between God and His people. The people, however, could only approach God through the priests.



The Old and New Covenants of God

In the Old Testament, we read how God made a covenant or agreement with His people. God promised salvation and forgiveness for sins instead of punishment, if the people obeyed Him. The blood of an innocent animal was sacrificed to remind the people of the punishment that they deserved.

In the New Testament, we read how Jesus took the punishment that we deserve. God agreed to accept the sacrifice of His Son as the price for our sins. This agreement requires sinners to repent and to obey God and to believe that they are forgiven through the blood of Jesus. We are all reminded of His sacrifice for us when we share communion together.

Because of the blood sacrificed by Jesus, we are made holy. We can now approach God at any time (Ephesians 2:18). His blood was the final sacrifice that God required for sin. Jesus is now our priest and our way to God (1 Timothy 2:5). He takes the place of the priest and the sacrifices they offered at the Temple altar.

The priests of Levi and Aaron died (Hebrews 7:23). But death could not destroy the priesthood of Jesus. This new order of Great High Priest is a work of God.

Jesus will always be there for all sinners who repent and seek God (7:24). 'People now come to God through Him. He is able to save them completely and for all time. Jesus lives forever. He prays for them' (7:25). This wonderful news means that we can ask in faith for the salvation of friends and relatives near and far away. Jesus hears us and talks to His Father about our prayers. He does this for us whenever we pray.

The writer says these things to remind the Jewish believers that now there is no need for high priests on earth. Jesus meets all our needs because He is holy, pure and without sin (7:26). 'Jesus gave one sacrifice for the sins of the people. He gave His life once and for all time. He did it by offering Himself' (7:27). The Son of God was the perfect sacrifice for sin and remains perfect forever (7:28).

Therefore, through Jesus alone, we are saved and brought back to God. We do not need priests or special saints to seek and pray to God for us. Jesus died to set these Hebrew believers free from many requirements of the Law. He died to set us all free from our sinful past. He died to set us free from useless religious traditions. His salvation brings us to our Lord God Almighty. He also sent the Holy Spirit to help us to be free from the power of sin.

This is the New Covenant between man and God. And Jesus is now our Great High Priest. If we confess our sins and repent, God is willing and able to forgive us (1 John 1:9).

Now read this: Hebrews Chapter 8

THE NEW COVENANT IN JESUS

This chapter confirms why Jesus gives a better ministry than earthly priests. He is now at the right hand side of the throne of God in Heaven (8:1). The right hand side means that Jesus is in a special place of authority.

A priest on earth is only a copy or shadow of the perfect ministry of Jesus in Heaven (8:5). Jesus has been given a greater work to do there by His Father (8:6). He is our mediator in Heaven between God and mankind. He enables us to come close to His heavenly Father. Jesus hears our prayers and asks the Lord God Almighty to answer them.

This New Covenant is therefore better than the Old Covenant that God made with Moses. Jesus now serves the people of God from His position in Heaven. This was the plan of God from the beginning of time. God forgives us if we confess our sins and accept Jesus as His perfect sacrifice for those sins.

The people of Israel disobeyed the Old Covenant. They did not keep the laws of God. Then God established His New Covenant. He made this New Covenant better than the Old Covenant. He promised it for all people everywhere who put their faith in His Son, Jesus, our Saviour.

God promised it first to the people of Israel and Judah (8:8; Jeremiah 31:31). He promised, 'I will put My laws in their minds. I will write My laws on their hearts. I will be their God. And they will be My people' (Hebrews 8:10; Jeremiah 31:33).

Jesus is the New Covenant. And He offers this New Covenant to all people, everywhere, Jews and non-Jews. The Holy Spirit helps us to learn and to understand this eternal salvation plan of God (Hebrews 8:11; 1 John 2:27).

The writer of Hebrews quotes more words of Jeremiah, the Old Testament prophet of God (Hebrews 8:8-12; Jeremiah 31:31-34). He believed that the prophecy of Jeremiah was fulfilled in Jesus. He tells us that the way to God in Heaven is now open for us. Jesus brings believers to God where they belong as His children. Alleluia!

Remember that the sacrifice of Jesus has been made once and for all times. We accept it by faith. His sacrifice is at work for all time. It goes on working for us throughout our lives. Our salvation remains true through the mercy of God and the sacrifice of Jesus. We are given a new life freed from the power of sin.

The Old Covenant has been made new (Hebrews 8:13). Jesus has given us a new understanding of the Law and the Prophets. He said, 'This is My
